

SUBJECT: Shannon Court/Kings Road Surgery Planning Application

Background

At a meeting of the Development Scrutiny committee on 26 October 2015 it was resolved to make no objection and to welcome the application to relocate the Kings Road surgery to Shannon Court.

Members noted that there were on-going discussions with the applicant regarding parking and agreed that a summary should be put before Town Council for ratification.

Information

The Town Clerk has continued discussions with Dr. J. Graffey from the surgery. The surgery do not want to disrupt arrangements for others coming to the centre of Sandy, but hope it will be possible to revise the car park layout a little to help the disabled and provide a facility for emergency vehicles.

Dr. Graffey stated that from the surgery's point of view, the most important thing is to have the town council's support for the scheme - which they believe will bring significant benefits to the town. They do however hope it will be possible to find ways to make it easy for people to access the facility and minimise disruption for others.

Request changes to the car parking layout

1) Emergency Vehicle Space

One space reserved for ambulances close to the surgery entrance
There is a disabled bay adjacent to Shannon court which could be adapted for
emergency vehicle use without needing to adjust the measurements of the
space. See picture below.



2) Disabled Bays

Increase the number of disabled bays to a total of six

There are currently three disabled bays; however one would be lost when converted to an emergency vehicle space. The surgery believes it may be a good idea to add further spaces at the Shannon Court end of the car park.

The proposed bays would be for general use, not for patient use.

A disabled bay is approximately 1.5 the size of a standard parking bay. The line of 6 standard parking bays in the picture below could be converted to 4 disabled bays. This would be the best location as wheel chair and mobility scooter users can access Shannon Court and the High Street without the need to pass through parked cars.



3) Reserved Spaces for Doctors

Four parking bays close to the entrance to the surgery to be reserved. The surgery are not seeking staff parking but would like four parking bays specifically for doctors. They are often called out to patients and need to ensure quick access to their vehicles.

4) Cross-hatching at the entrance to Shannon Court

Cross-hatch the area in front of the entrance for pedestrian safety

The area at the entrance to Shannon Court is quite narrow and the surgery
note that there is a risk this may get congested, as it is the only way in and out
of the market square end of the car park.

Implications for the Town Council

Current number of public parking Spaces: 147 (inc. 3 disabled bays)

Proposed number of public parking spaces: 140 (inc 6 disabled bays)

The current line markings would need to be burnt off and new markings painted out, include 'Reserved' markings for the doctor's spaces. The Town Clerk has arranged for estimated costs which will be available by 9th November and will be reported to members at the meeting of the Full Council.

For Councillors information previous line marking work carried out in 2010 cost approximately £1,600.

At this stage it appears unlikely NHS funding would be available towards external work, as they would take the view that they could only provide funding for parking or other works that were part of the property that they were reimbursing rent for. However, Dr. Graffey is seeking clarification and will report back to the clerk.

It is **recommended** that the Council agree the above changes in principle, dependant on the costs involved and that the Town Clerk continue to work with Dr. Graffey to identify possible alternative funding.

Request

Sandy Town Council has received a request from the Sandy and Beeston Good Neighbours group to consider allowing the Talk of the Town community bus to be registered at the Town Council address on vehicle the log book.

The vehicle would remain in the ownership of, and registered to Talk of the Town and the Council would not be responsible for the bus, its drivers or any costs.

Background

The 'Talk of the Town' (TOTT) community bus is run entirely by volunteers and can be hired by groups or individuals, with or without drivers, to transport local people, (particularly the elderly) to various places, such as outings and social events. The service has been running since 1982.

The TOTT was recently taken over by Sandy and Beeston Good Neighbours as the original committee could no longer run the bus for a variety of reasons (lack of volunteer drivers and time etc)

The bus is registered with the DVLA in the name of TOTT, but with the address on the log book registered at one of the committee members addresses. This has caused problems as the log book often has to be returned to the DVLA to be reregistered every time volunteers leave the committee. Therefore having the bus registered at the Council address emerged as a possible solution.

For members information past users of the service have included Ivel Stroke Club, carers in Bedfordshire, Sandy Lunch Club, and residents of Handley Court, Stonecroft, Copelands, Jakes Court and Taymer Nursing homes. Other community groups such as Great Barford Good Companions, Sandy Townswomen's Guild and Sandy Historical Society also use the bus.

All drivers are volunteers and are covered by the group's public liability insurance. Drivers need to be under the age of 70 and have a D1 qualification on their licence.

The current bus carries carry 13 passengers or up to 3 wheelchairs if some seats are removed.

SUBJECT: East West Rail Link

Background

On the 1st October 2015 Network Rail held a consultation event on the proposed East West Rail Link. The consultation focused on proposals for the East West Rail (EWR) Western Section Phase 2, which involves sections of the line between Bedford-Bicester and Milton Keynes.

The EWR aims to establish a strategic railway connecting East Anglia with Central, Southern and Western England. The proposed route can be broken down into three sections, Western, Central and Eastern. The section of the route which may come via Sandy is the Central Section.

The purpose of this report is to gather any information that is currently available on the Central section of the rail link, of which a route via Sandy is a possible option.

Information

Following the consultation contact was made with Caryl Jones, Communications Manager of the East West Rail Consortium. Mrs Jones has stated that there is not a lot of information available in regards the implications of a route via Sandy at present.

The following information was provided:

- Work is continuing on identifying a single preferred route to extend the western section eastwards to Cambridge.
- At present, two preferred 'corridors' have emerged as offering the best value for money when considering the potential benefits the line could yield, and the costs involved.
- The corridors are fairly broad and only once a preferred corridor has been identified will two or three potential routes within this corridor be considered in far greater detail.
- The East West Rail Consortium is aiming to have a single preferred route identified by September 2016. This will be when the 'Initial Industry Plan' is published by Network Rail and will include potential schemes for future investment.

- Thus, at this stage the East West Rail Consortium cannot give any further detail on the likely route should the 'via Sandy' corridor emerge as offering the best benefit to cost ratio and value for money.
- There may be further information in spring 2016 regarding the corridor selection process. At present it is still a work in progress and without a proposed option and supporting evidence there is nothing to consult on.

Network Rail has not provided any additional information. A conditional output statement is available on the website; this is 140 pages long and has not been attached to this report. A diagram of the Central section corridor options is attached.

The conditional output statement was commissioned in October 2013 to determine a business case of a new rail route from Cambridge to Bedford. Further detail on feasibility, deliverability and adoption of specific routes where new infrastructure may be required will be explored as the current development of a business case.

There were initially 7 possible corridors considered for the rail link. In July 2015 it was reported this had been narrowed to two, Sandy and Hitchin, which offer best value for money at that point of development, and both corridors would be considered further.

The link between Bedford, Sandy and Cambridge has been identified as the most difficult and costly part of the route to reinstate, due to land along the previous route been sold and developed.

Network Rail is in the process of evaluating these two corridors to identify a preferred corridor, the routes within that corridor will then be considered. A development team are producing a detailed analysis of the merits or otherwise of each option. The criteria used to determine route preference will include:


- Journey time between major centres
- Size of newly-served population/market
- Development potential
- Affordability
- Buildability
- Operational cost between centres
- Environment impacts
- Benefits versus Costs

A more detailed progress report will be updated after the analysis has taken place. It is currently unknown when this will be.

The Town Clerk will keep regular contact with Newtwork Rail and Caryl Jones and report back any updates to Members.

Carole Hounslow - A life working and supporting Sandy Many families might identify Sandy as a pretty, quiet resting place for their loved ones, even though they have limited or no links to the Parish. In my wife's case, I hope the Council will consider this not to be so and make a recommendation that resident fees should apply.

Home and Family

It is now over 50 years since my late wife Carole and I moved out from London following our wedding, to Glebe Road, Sandy in 1965. Our first home together was part of a new development and saw the then small market garden town of just 4000 residents grow significantly. Our first connection to Sandy was with Cllr Weston in 1964 on the newly laid out Glebe Road — still a muddy field with the houses yet to be built!

Carole, always keen to support local businesses arranged our mortgage with Sandy Building Society. Our bank account remains linked to the Sandy branch of Lloyds to this day and even after we moved to Eaton Ford Carole maintained long established links to Sandy businesses she had come to trust including Alders the optician, Gunns the Bakery and Gilbeys.

Our daughter, Suzanne, was born in 1971 was christened at St Swithun's parish church. Carole and Suzanne were active members of the congregation while she was young with Suzanne subsequently attending St Swithun's Church of England Primary school at the old site and Sunday school at St Swithun's under Reverend Warren and Reverend Rowlands.

Career□

After a successful career in London as a shoe buyer it was the main body of Carole's career that is linked to Sandy. The work outlined below covers the period between 1965 and 2000. Carole retired as Registrar at The Physics department of The University of Cambridge in 2005.

Sandy Town Council

Still looking after a young family Carole worked for Sandy Town Council supporting William Hanford, the then Town Clerk. At a time before "flexible hours" for working parents had been invented as a phrase, her role at the Council enabled Carole to maintain her career balanced with the needs of her family. This job also included a uniquely Sandy tradition whereby on a recognized day each year, the Town Clerk, the Vicar of St Swithun's and Carole went out onto glebe land behind Robert Peel School to a point colloquially known as "Amen corner", where the Vicar blessed the land and prayers were said, followed by the assembled saying "Amen". The Town Clerk then paid a "fee" of a silver coin to the Church. Carole's handwriting will also be found in the Parish archives as she maintained the record book for burials on behalf of the Town Clerk.

RSPB

The RSPB afforded new opportunities for both work and leisure. As the popularity of conservation and the importance of awareness and preservation of natural habitats grew in the 1970s, Carole promoted this both locally and within her own family. Suzanne grew up as a member of the RSPB and Carole continued her own support of

the RSPB until 2013, where she worked as a volunteer taking knowledge of birds into primary schools and encouraging young people to look after the habitats that encourage birds into gardens and engage with the natural world.

Jordans

Work at Jordan's Mill in the 1980s brought Carole close to two areas that informed how our home was run — natural foods produced locally.

Harvey's Garage

Once Suzanne moved on to Junior School Carole chose to go back to work full time, but wanted to stay local to home in Sandy. Working for Lawrence Harvey at his garage throughout the 1980s and into the 90s Carole enjoyed her role at the heart of this bustling busy local business. Ann Harvey remembers Carole well from those days, and while the garage itself has gone, a new car business remains on the site.

Banks of Sandy

As PA to Michael and Richard Banks and John Rowlands, Carole's work at Banks of Sandy was a busy full-time role which drew on links back to local farming families Carole recalled from our earliest days in Sandy. Farmers she met at the Council offices while working for William Hanford. As Suzanne by now was at Senior School and subsequently moved away to London to University, Banks afforded a career opportunity to further develop skills acquired over a number of years. Even after we moved to Eaton Ford, Carole continued to commute to Sandy for this role until she moved to Cambridge University – the role she held for 6 years until her retirement in 2005

<u>Charity</u>□

Sandy Rotary and Inner wheel was a big part of Carole's life since the 1990s where both my wife and I chose to retain our links to Sandy through long established friendships and the Rotary Club.

As a member of Inner Wheel Carole's social life in retirement included bi weekly catch ups in Sandy. Beyond the day to day business of support for Inner Wheel, it was these friendships over fund raisers, social evenings and "knit and natter" that maintained Carole's links back to Sandy.

Carole wasn't just a member of Inner Wheel — she served as Treasurer and Charities Secretary on numerous occasions and also as President three times between 1990 and 2015. Her last Presidency only ended in late May follow her diagnosis with Non Hodgkin's Lymphoma and her recent death from cancer in June.

Carole had a strong belief in supporting those in need close to home and as a consequence chose Keech House as her nominated charity while as President. Additionally Sandy Inner Wheel have recently notified me that they are making a donation to Keech House in her memory.
